

Indoor Flying for 2011

We are all set for indoor flying again this year.

Location: Pieters Family Life, 1025 Commons Way, Rochester, NY off East Henrietta Road near the intersection with I390 and next to the Canandaigua National Bank.

Here are the dates for the 2011 -2012 season:

November 5 and 19 December 3 and 17 January 7 and 21 February 4 and 18 March 3 and 17 and 31

All dates are Saturdays and flying times are 2 - 4 pm.

Like last year, please commit to join for an upfront fee of \$10. The fee is required (one time only) before flying at your first session.

This establishes a reserve fund so that a light turnout on a given date due to bad weather, other commitments or whatever, will not overly burden those few in attendance with the \$60 per session rental fee.

We will collect equally at each session by dividing the \$60 rental fee by the number of flyers in attendance. If the resulting fee per person is "excessive" (greater than \$10 each?), then the reserve fund will be used to make up the difference.

As the season progresses, any remaining money in the reserve fund will be used to pay for remainder of the season session(s), at no further cost to the attendees. Last season, our March sessions required no fee collections.

Photo from 1942

Here is a picture that turned up on the internet. It was one of a large number of photos which were of particular interest because of the early reproduction in color. Besides the outstanding color and obvious modeling connection, there are several other points to ponder.

Look at the girl's legs. This kid new how to have fun! She's been out having a good time all morning and isn't about to waste any time cleaning up until forced to before she crawls into bed. Check out the boy's right shoe. What happened to that lace? My bet is that he is willing to risk a loose sneaker so he can tie the lace to one of the model's wings. He'll end up with a flying model that will be the envy of the neighborhood. Next check out the soles of his shoes. This guy knows how to extract the maximum of use out of casual wear. Those shoes may in fact be a prize possession; how many acres of garden did he weed and how many errands did he run to earn those babies? See Ray Bradbury's Dandelion Wine for further information on the magic contained in a boy's sneakers.

Finally, the image was made in the summer of 1942. The battle of Coral Sea was over and perhaps the Battle of Midway was still in the news. A photo from the newspaper may have prompted this project or consider the possibility that the model may be inspired by the exploits of an older brother or neighbor already serving in the south Pacific. There is plenty more to study in this scene (consider the lad's intense concentration; it is a gift to lose oneself in such effort) but that is enough for this caption. Further investigation of "the rest of the story" is left to the reader.

Meeting Minutes from the WNYFFS 2011 Annual Meeting

This year's meeting was held on November 12, 2011. Once again we were hosted by Terry Hills Country Club. Club president Brad Bane called the meeting to order at 1:52.

Old Business

The first item of old business was the treasurer's report, ably delivered by Ruth Bane. Ruth's report indicated that the club's finances are in good order and our net assets are in better shape that at the same point last year.

The next item typically covered is the reading of the minutes from the previous year's meeting. Art Thieme moved that we accept the minutes as published in the Fall 2010 edition of the Thermal Journal. The motion was seconded and approved with no objections.

New Business

The first item of new business raised by Brad was the annual contribution to the 1941 HAG Musuem. During the ensuing discussion, it was pointed out that the museum is most appreciative of the contribution we make each year and that increasing the membership in the museum is also much desired. In the end, Lyle Whitford moved that we make a \$600 donation. This was seconded by Ruth Bane and the motion passed unanimously by voice.

Next up was President Brad Bane's announcement of the flying event dates for 2012. Unfortunately, the announcement from the AMA that the Nationals would be held on August 6-10 in Muncie made our original booking of August 10-12 for the Empire State Free Flight Society Championships (ESFFC) in Geneseo impractical. *The official date for the ESFFC is now August 24-26.* There is some risk of increased hotel demand that weekend since it is the last weekend prior to classes started at the University of Geneseo so plan on making reservations early. The originally reserved dates (August 10-12) will be available for those who wish to use the field for practice or fun fly.

In addition to the ESFFC, the Hobo meet is scheduled for May 19 & 20. Although no decision or commitment was made, there was much talk and enthusiasm for holding a meet in October.

Lyle Whitford passed around copies of the announcement page (as included in the Thermal Journal) for this year's ESFFC. Many of the events were light on participants. For details, review the Summer edition of the TJ which includes all the results. Lyle ask that we review the event list with an eye to changes that may help drive participation. This can be discussed in more detail at the planning meeting.

To wrap up the discussion of flying meets, Roy Smith reviewed the Great Grape Gathering. Flying weather was Great, as was the turnout. All who participated in the Friday Fish Fry and the Chicken Bar-B-Q were quite enthusiastic. Including the FAI events worked out quite well and probably added about 10 flyers to the total participants. John Clapp served as the CD for the FAI events.

Last, Ruth Bane announced that the planning meeting will once again be hosted at the Bane residence. Plan on arriving at noon on (Saturday) January 7, 2012 January 14, 2012. The Banes will provide Lunch, feel free to bring a salad, desert or a libation you prefer, if you like.

To complete the cycle, reservations were also made for next year's Annual Meeting at Terry Hills. The date for that meeting is November 10, 2012.

With that, Bob Clemens made a motion to adjourn which was seconded by Professor Joe. Surprisingly, there were no objections.

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YANKEE AIR PIRATE NEWS



In the last Yankee Air Pirate News, it was mentioned that Jerry Crawmer suggested a special pirate event. Jerry has already put together a rules proposal for your consideration. Here is what Jerry has come up with:

The Yankee Air Pirates Vietnam Jet Event

- 1. Event will be conducted to FAC rules for Jet Catapult Scale (event #23). Winner is eligible for a Kanone (of course, that is, if we have three or more contestants).
- 2. Entries will be limited to manned jet aircraft that participated in the Vietnam War. If your model is not one of the well-known aircraft that everyone knows was there (such as the F-4 Phantom II, F-105, MIG-21, B-52, or A-6A Intruder), be prepared to defend your choice.
- 3. Coloring and markings appropriate for Vietnam are encouraged but not required.
- 4. Some of us have found our efforts at producing a Jet Catapult Scale model have resulted in performance less than we hoped for. So, in the spirit of the Yankee Air Pirates, at the end of the day we'll have a target landing contest (ala lawn darts) for any and all FAC Jet Catapult Scale models. One practice try allowed (must be announced as a try before "flight"); one "flight" for record; closest model wins. Prize will be some piratical liquid refreshment.

Seems like Jerry's proposal is pretty much on the money for an easily specialized FAC event. Getting a Kanone for the event should be straightforward as long as the event is publicized ahead of time. Of course that will be confirmed with FAC GHQ prior to any official meets. It would be nice if, as suggested, the models were finished in markings appropriate to the Vietnam conflict. However, many of the aircraft flew with camouflage and it is hard to look forward to searching for a small camouflaged profile model in the frequently tall grass in Geneseo. They may not be scale masterpieces but they still take time to build and paint. As far as the comments on performance of these models, we'll just have to wait and see. My B-47 Canberra will probably be competitive in regular HLG! (Maybe that's a bit optimistic; perhaps it's the rum talking.) If anyone has suggestions to improve the rules send them in soon.

Here is Jerry's note and a few comments on his event suggestion:

Attached is a draft list of rules for the subject event, and a possible fun-fly event. I'll be happy to sponsor both. Please take a look at rule #3 in particular. My thought was that it might be easier to judge the models if we weren't too particular about the specific time frame for colors and insignia, and that a builder could choose a scale color scheme that might show up better in the air and on the ground than some drab colors that might have been used during the war. If the weather cooperates, I plan to be at the GGG, and we can discuss it then.

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Mid America Aviation Museum

While returning from our Western States vacation this spring, my wife and I stopped in Liberal Kansas; home to the *Land of Oz Museum* and the *Mid America Aviation Museum*. This stop was not on our planned itinerary. We just happened to notice a bill board calling out both of these attractions. We visited both museums but it should be easy to guess which one received the lion's share of time.

Mid America displays over 100 aircraft in somewhat crowded conditions. Aircraft were packed so close together that it made it hard to get good images of several of interest. Aircraft displayed outdoors were well separated but in somewhat poor condition. On the bright side, the selection was great and it's always cool to spend a few hours looking at airplanes. Here are a few pictures of the planes that caught my interest.

The first two photos are of a Fairchild 24-C8F in US Coast Guard dress. In service during WWII, these were designated the UC-6. Looks like this livery would make a very attractive scheme for a model.

Next up (actually down) is a vintage 1937 Rearwin 7000 Sportster. These aircraft were produced in Nearby Kansas from 1935 to 1940. Yet another attractive color scheme for a model.

Bringing up the bottom of the first column is a somewhat unusual model of the Republic F105 Thunderchief. Sixty model Fs were converted to model G electronic counter measure or "Wild Weasels". Despite the high losses in Viet Nam, perhaps someone will consider the Thud as an entry in the Yankee Air Pirate special Jet/ Rocket catapult glider competition. (Good Luck.)

Below are two images of a home built Moni Motor Glider. There wasn't too much information provided but the color scheme is interesting, representing the official logo of the nearby State of New Mexico.

Indoor Flying Challenge

I'm proposing that those of us who enjoy flying simple indoor models engage in a one-design competition during the remainder of our indoor flying season (it ends in March). In a recent issue of Flying Models magazine there were full-size plans for four easy-to-build all-sheet balsa rubber models. Some of you may have seen them. The basic model is called the ROG 1. It has a span of 16 inches, uses a balsa stick for the body, and can be built with either "V" dihedral or polyhedral for its flat sheet balsa wing. I believe this model could be built easily in an hour or two, perhaps less, and it should fly well. Although the plan calls for 1/16" sheet for the wing and tail, I suggest we use 1/32" to save a bit of weight.

Rules would be simple:

- Model must be built according to the plan and to the size shown on the plan as printed out from the provided jpg file.
- A plastic prop of no more than 6" diameter would be used. No scraping to save weight. Ikara props are OK.
- Timing would begin at the release for an unassisted R.O.G. launch.
- Scoring would be the total of three flights. No minimum flight time for an official flight.

I will offer a full color enlargement of one of my aviation photographs to whoever has the single longest flight of the season.

One of the other plans is for a flying wing. I plan to give this one a try too. File on request.
